

#### Unemployment is on the Rise


On March 16, 2020, the Contra Costa County Public Health Officer issued a Shelter-in-Place Order in response to the Coronavirus epidemic. Businesses deemed to be non-essential were required to close at physical locations, leading to an immediate surge in job losses.

According to the Federal Reserve, unemployment had been steadily falling in Contra Costa since July 2010 (11.3%), leveling off in 2018 and 2019 (average 2.8%). March 2020 saw a jump to 4%, with a spike to 14.5% in April. Since February 2020, the number of layoffs and business closures happening all over the County has markedly increased. This is reflected in the increased number of New Weekly Unemployment Insurance Claims.

New Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) Claims New Weekly UI Claims

The impact can be seen in the New Weekly Unemployment Insurance Claims, Unemployment Rate and Self-Reported Layoffs. Applications for benefit programs, especially CalFresh food assistance, quickly followed.

Note: Initial claims totals are not representative of the number of individuals filing, as a claimant can have multiple initial claims. Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) refers to the provision in the CARES Act that allows self-employed individuals, independent contractors and other non W-2 workers to apply for Unemployment Benefits.

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
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### How People Are Getting Help

CalFresh, CalWORKs, and Medi-Cal Applications 2019 to 2020 Comparison, February 1st Week (Week 5) to May 3rd Week (Week 22)



April 2020 saw the deposit of the first \$1,200 stimulus checks. Check distribution has continued in recent weeks and may account for some of the drop in CalFresh and CalWORKs applications, along with approval of newly applied for unemployment insurance benefits. The end of COBRA benefits and/or dependent care coverage may cause an increase in Medi-Cal applications in coming weeks. The recent decrease in Medi-Cal applications in Contra Costa County mirrors a trend seen at the state level. We are confirming and evaluating the data for further analysis.


2,200 additional applications pending review and registration

CalFresh (California's name for the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program/SNAP) provides supplementary assistance for food budgets. Certain households with extenuating circumstances may be eligible for an expedited benefits determination.

CalWORKs (California's name for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) includes financial aid, employment services, homeless assistance, child care, and other supportive services to families with children under 19, to help them succeed in the workforce and become self-sufficient.

Medi-Cal (California's name for Medicaid) provides a core set of health benefits, including doctor visits and hospital care.

California has been approved to provide emergency allotments to eligible households for two months, March and April 2020. Emergency allotments will raise each household's regular monthly CalFresh allotment to the maximum allowable benefits based on their CalFresh household size. CalFresh households already receiving the maximum allowable allotment based on household size are not eligible to receive an emergency allotment of CalFresh benefits.


## How Small Businesses Are Getting Help

Between April 23rd and April 30th, 666 callers from 10 cities accessed the Small Business Call Center.

Between May 1st and May 7th, 128 callers from 15 cities accessed the Small Business Call Center.




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### Contra Costa Rapid Response

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
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
### Fewer Reports of Maltreatment are Coming in from Mandated Reporters

Mandated reporters who view children in educational environments are often the main source of child abuse reporting. With children out of school due to Shelter-in-Place, mandated reporters, such as teachers and counsellors, are unable to sound the alarm for help. In this case, a drop in the number of maltreatment reports does not necessarily mean a drop in abuse. This change is likely attributed to fewer people reporting the abuse that is happening. For vulnerable adults, average weekly calls have fallen during the Shelter-in-Place period, compared to the weekly average over the prior 6 weeks (February 3 – March 15, 2020) and the weekly average over the period of March 4 -May 12, 2019. However, the numbers have rebounded slightly from the low point of March 30 - April 12.

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
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
### Fewer Reports of Maltreatment are Coming in from Community Reporters

### STAND! Calls and E-mails



Community partner organizations echo the drop in assistance requests. Calls for Domestic Violence assistance to STAND! for Families Free of Violence, Contra Costa's Domestic Violence prevention and assistance organization, dropped as Shelter-in-Place orders kept callers in close proximity to their abusers and limited their ability to make private calls. STAND!'s Lethality Assessment Program work with law enforcement partners has not seen a similar decline.


#### STAND! Lethality Assessment Program (LAP) Intakes



The Lethality Assessment Program (LAP) is a high-risk assessment initiated by STAND! and 5 collaborating police jurisdictions with victims of intimate partner violence. The total is all LAP screens initiated during the month. Then the score is broken down into High danger (at high risk of being killed by partner), Not High Danger (lower risk) and No Answer (victim declined or was unable to answer questions).

Community Violence Solutions saw a drop in clients between the end of March and early April.

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
#### Fewer Reports of Maltreatment are Coming in from Community Reporters

The Family Justice Center also saw a drop in clients between the end of March and early April. Contra Costa Crisis Center reported a surge in 211 calls in March and April, and a decline in crisis hotline calls in April.

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
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
#### Essential Workers Look to Emergency Childcare Amid School Closures
