Medi-Cal Redeterminations and Possible Scams

The unwinding of the Public Health Emergency affects many of our EHSD customers, specifically Medi-Cal beneficiaries in Contra Costa County, who **must take action** to ensure they and their family members keep their Medi-Cal coverage.

The Medi-Cal continuous coverage requirement that was implemented as part of the response to the COVID-19 pandemic ended in March. In April, the processing of annual redeterminations of eligibility, discontinuances, and negative actions for the Medi-Cal programs resumed.

This means that starting with June renewal dates, Medi-Cal recipients must complete their Medi-Cal renewals in the month they are due. They must report any changes to their contact information (name, address, phone number or email) or household situation to EHSD if they live in Contra Costa County.

EHSD is leading an outreach campaign to help community members understand what they need to do to ensure their Medi-Cal coverage continues.



EHSD has adapted materials from the Department of Health Care Service (DHCS) to help reach Medi-Cal beneficiaries about important renewal information.

If you receive inquiries from customers about their Medi-Cal coverage, you can direct them to KeepMediCalCoverage.org or MantengaSuMediCal.org (in Spanish) where they can:

- Get to <u>BenefitsCal.com</u> for Contra Costa County
- 2. Complete a form to sign up for updates about Medi-Cal renewals (via email or text)
- 3. See a reminder to check their mailboxes for a letter about Medi-Cal eligibility

Community members can also call the MCSC line, however, we are encouraging them to go <u>online</u> to update contact info and complete renewals, whenever possible.

We are also alerting customers about Medi-Cal renewal scams that have unfortunately surfaced throughout the U.S. Anyone who suspects or knows of a scam should report the incident to DHCS by emailing fraud@dhcs.ca.gov.

Note that Contra Costa County and the State of California never require payment in the Medi-Cal application or renewal process.



Your Expense Reports in Workday

You may be aware that there is a new way to enter employee reimbursements now that Contra Costa County is using Workday, its new financial management system that went live on April 1st.

Before you prepare and submit your first Workday expense report, it is important that you take the online training that is now available, as well as reference the job aids that are on Vector Solutions. Detailed instructions for accessing the online training course are at this **STARS link**.

All County employees are automatically set up with access to create their own

Get Connected! California Day

EHSD partnered with Contra Costa County Library to host a Get Connected! California

Day at the San Pablo Library on Saturday, April 22. We joined 13 other locations around the state to promote the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) and help people enroll on site. The ACP is a federally funded program that provides monthly credits up to \$30 toward internet service bills for eligible households, as well as a one-time discount up to \$100 toward the purchase of a laptop,

desktop computer or tablet, with participating providers.

The EHSD team featured Susan Padan and Sandra Zepeda-Lopez, EHSD Navigators; Larena Baldazo, EHSD Web Producer; and Patty Perez, Workforce Services Specialist. Also on hand were representatives from the California Emerging Technology Fund (CETF), which sponsored the day of events. After a few

start-up bugs, we were able to help several people enroll in the program and learned a

We will be increasingly engaged in ACP outreach activities in the days ahead, coordinated through Community Relations.

Building Brighter Futures Together



When you sign on to become a foster parent, you find out very quickly that there's a learning curve — figuring out where to find the services and resources for the child or teen in your care. How to interact with the birth family. How to

navigate the legal system.

For those answers, many new foster parents turn to Nancy Deweese, one of Contra Costa County's most respected foster parents. For nearly 34 years, she and her husband Gary have been fostering mostly drug-exposed infants while tapping into Nancy's professional experience as a neonatal nurse to care for them. Nancy has been the State Foster Parent Association local chapter president for the past 15 years. The mother of four biological children has also been running the foster parent mentor program for the past eleven years. The program matches new foster

parents with experienced ones who know the ropes. And for six years, from 2008 thru 2014, Nancy ran the foster parent orientation meetings for people interested in signing up.

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"It's rewarding to reunite babies with their biological parents after counseling, or watching the babies grow up and thrive in their new adoptive homes," says Nancy. "I respect the legal system for the work they do, but I don't always agree with the decisions that come out of courts."

While caregivers may not decide where children are ultimately placed, their insight is valuable when considering reunifying children with their biological families. Reunification remains a priority when safe for the child/teen, and in the best interest for her/his wellbeing.

Nancy expresses concern that many of the face-to-face working relationships between

foster parents and social workers have suffered in the wake of the COVID pandemic. "I think the hands-on work is being lost in all of the paper work," she says. Meanwhile, the Foster Family Network is working with CFS to improve and strengthen those ties for the sake of the children and the families, and to retain current foster parents.

During National Foster Care Month, EHSD salutes Nancy – and all our foster caregivers – for their ongoing dedication to children and teens who need a secure, loving environment in which they can grow and thrive.

Building a Strong Team

Over the years, Nancy Deweese has shared her experiences with EHSD's Children and Family Services to help strengthen connections between caregivers and social workers. Nancy says that continuously improving communication and teamwork to support children and families is key.

- Honor State regulations with monthly in-person visit and discussion with Caregiver to pinpoint resources and referrals for child's needs.
- · Respond to Caregivers' calls and messages in a timely manner.
- · Consider Caregivers part of the team. Invite them to Child Family Team (CFT) meetings, provide child's attorney contact
 - information and keep them informed about the progression of the child's case.

- Respect Caregivers' time and family life when scheduling biological parent visits, etc.
- · Have a transition plan collaborating with Caregivers' input and child's needs.
- Inform Caregivers when there is a change in the child's assigned Social Worker, and provide new social worker's contact information.
- Develop a Respite Home list to provide relief for seasoned Caregivers.





How a Big Gift is Helping Improve Family Healing

The Taylor Family Foundation donated \$15,000 last year to VESTIA with a request to direct the funds toward children. VESTIA Board of Directors approved giving it to Children and Family Services to enhance the CFS visitation rooms in the various district offices with toys, furniture, cribs, etc.

Visitation rooms help foster continued family connections for children who have been removed from the care of their biological parents and/or guardians. The rooms provide a safe and private place to heal despite the removal of children from their primary homes during court ordered visits between children, parents, guardians and siblings who are not in the same foster placement.

The rooms are outfitted with comfortable furnishings and age appropriate toys to assist the family in engaging in activities. Visitation supervisors provide support and encouragement to parents who are experiencing difficulty in engaging with their children; they provide feedback and input on the progress of visits for social workers to update the Court.

CalFresh Awareness Month

In Contra Costa County, 93,822 residents are receiving CalFresh as of February of this year. CalFresh food benefits stretch household budgets, enabling recipients to afford nutritious food, including more fruits, vegetables, and other healthy options. During **CalFresh Awareness Month** in May, EHSD and our partners across the County and the state are encouraging residents to apply for CalFresh. By helping eligible community members meet their nutritional needs, CalFresh can help many children and families achieve better health and well-being. Approximately 4.7 million Californians currently receive CalFresh

food benefits, yet it is estimated that nearly 2 million may be eligible for food assistance and do not yet use it. CalFresh is not welfare and it is not considered cash aid. Many who may be eligible include college students, full- or part-time workers, and U.S.-born children with non-citizen parents.

In May, County staff from across all departments will have another chance to build upon the learnings from the tabletop exercise during a Golden Eagle Training & Drill with the Bay Area Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) and Bay Area Joint Information System (JIS).

Climate Change shifts in


assist with MEDS so the customer could receive continuity of care.

Uju was also helpful with incorrect addresses on MEDS that caused disenrollment from the managed care plan and reached out to the Managed Care Ombudsman to correct the situation.

Uju has been with EHSD for over 20 years and is knowledgeable and very responsive. She readily takes on issues that require immediate attention. Uju is a huge help to the Medi-Cal program and is a pleasure to work with.





Community Action Agencies have a 59-year history of promoting self-sufficiency for those with limited income. They were created when the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 was signed into law.

Did you know that EHSD's Community Services Bureau (CSB) is the Community Action Agency for Contra Costa County?

CSB and its many community partners have made essential contributions to individuals and families in Contra Costa County by providing innovative and cost-effective programs. During Fiscal Year 2022, they assisted 12,181 unduplicated individuals in Contra Costa County using \$396,393 in CARES Act funding.

Low-income residents continue to need opportunities to improve their lives and their living conditions. Community Services Block Grant funding that the Community Action Program administers in collaboration with the Economic Opportunity Council continues to support safety net services to help alleviate poverty in our County.

We celebrate and recognize May 2023 as **National Community Action Month,** along with Community Action Agencies and Economic Opportunity Councils throughout the country.


