EHSD Recognized for Expedient CalFresh Service

Some exciting news for our CalFresh staff at EHSD. In late April during the CalFresh Roundtable discussion, the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) presented Statewide Timeliness awards for the 33-month period stretching throughout the pandemic, April 1, 2020 through December 31, 2022.

CDSS awarded Contra Costa County EHSD for Most Improved in 3-day, Expedited Service Timeliness. During this period, CDSS noted that EHSD improved its timeliness compliance rate by 39.5%. The award goes to WFS staff and Managers, Aging and Adult Services, General Assistance Intake for pulling data for reports and Staff Development for assisting with production of an e-learning video.

This is an amazing achievement earned throughout one of the most challenging periods. It is truly a testament to the great work and continued effort put forth by the entire Department. Building Brighter Futures Together

Interview Blitz Pilots New Recruitment Process

Staff Development and Personnel hosted an Interview Blitz, May 10th and 11th, at the Staff Development office in Concord. Open recruitment happened in the span




of five weeks, starting April 14th. Typical open recruitment usually takes 3-6 months. The jobs were posted for the shortest allowable time – 7 days – and 233 people applied with 175 who qualified to take the exam.

- 76 people passed the exam and were referred to the requisition
- 72 people were scheduled for an interview
- 54 people passed the interview process
- 34 people attended the NEO on May 22 with 19 currently set to start in August

This is a true pilot in terms of the recruitment timeline; everything was accomplished in just five weeks! All candidates who passed the exam were notified about their start date and salary immediately, so they could begin forming a decision as they went into their interviews.

County Human Resources also temporarily authorized EHSD to process I-9 and COVID vaccination records. Personnel was also all hands on deck ensuring candidates were scheduled for interviews, with staff communicating with them via email and phone.

The National Association of Counties (NACo) has recognized the Contra Costa County Employment




the NACo award

The Inaugural Asian American Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander Celebration

On May 9, 2023, the Contra Costa County **Board of Supervisors** honored Asian American Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander (AANHPI) culture and traditions at the first **AANHPI Heritage Month** Celebration in Board Chambers, in Martinez. The event theme. "Uplifting Our Heritage, Resilience, and Legacies" paid tribute to the AANHPI community that is made up of culturally and linguistically diverse people representing populations from many countries and islands residing in Contra Costa

County. Nearly one in five Contra Costa residents identify as AANHPI.

I had the pleasure to co-emcee this inaugural event. This was special to me, as I came to Contra Costa County at a young age, my family received assistance from County services, and I was able to show gratitude for my home county and honor those who paved the way for new AANHPI generations.

The official designation of May as Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) Heritage Month was signed into federal law in 1992. The month of May was chosen to observe AAPI for several reasons, including to commemorate the first Japanese who came to the country in May of 1843, and to mark the May 1869 completion of the Transcontinental Railroad, which involved the labor of many Chinese immigrants.

Contra Costa Health Services chaired the event in partnership with the Contra Costa Asian American Pacific Islander Coalition (CoCo AAPI Coalition), various county offices and volunteer

An American Evolution: Persecuted Southeast Asians Gather at Buddhist Temple

There's something uniquely American about the Wat Lao Rattanaram Theravada Buddhist Temple in Richmond where EHSD Admin Program/Projects Coordinator **Oravanh Thammasen** worships. While the Buddhist temple serves much of the Lao community, many of its worshipers come from minority ethnic regions of different Southeast Asian Countries (Cambodia, Thailand, Myanmar) where they were persecuted and forced to leave.

"My father was born in Yunnan province, China where his Dai ethnic people were persecuted by the Chinese government," says Oravanh. "His family escaped to Laos, then he went to Thailand where he met my mother." Oravanh's father is one of many worshipers, at the Buddhist temple who make up a diverse patchwork of persecuted ethnic Southeast Asians who might not have come together if not for their quest for religious, political freedom and a better life in America.

"You can hear all of the different Southeast Asian languages and dialects being spoken in the Buddhist temple," says Oravanh. "But the chants are in an ancient language called Pali. It's very similar to how the Roman Catholic Church used to be where mass was spoken and sung in Latin."

So just like many European Americans (German, Italian, Irish, French) who immigrated to the U.S., then intermixed at Christian churches and intermarried, a similar mixing of diverse Southeast Asians have come together in America.

"It's hard to feel connected with Southeast Asian culture while raising a family in California, but the temple is one of the few places where my family and I can gather with other Buddhists and my boys can learn more about their roots," says Oravanh. "It's a gathering space not just for my kids, but for the entire community, and we need to preserve it for future generations."

Older Adults in Contra Costa County June is Elder and Dependent Adult Abuse Awareness Month

The size of Contra Costa County's older adult population is the fastest growing segment of our population. According to 2020 U.S. Census estimates, the number of age 60+ individuals in our county is 251,216.

Tracy Murray presented a comprehensive report about Aging & Adult Services (AAS) in Contra Costa County to the Board of Supervisors during its May 23rd meeting (Tracy was the EHSD Aging & Adult Services Director at the time; she is now the director of Workforce Services). As part of her AAS overview, Tracy noted an increase in the number of individuals served through Adult Protective Services (APS).

Elder and Dependent Adult Abuse Awareness Month in June is an opportunity to heighten attention about supporting older adults and those dependent on others for their care and wellbeing.

Abuse can be physical, financial, emotional, or psychological; neglect by caregiver or self-neglect, and abandonment or isolation from friends or care. Adult Protective Services (APS) assesses and investigates reports. APS, part of EHSD's Adult & Aging Services Bureau, received 5,975 reports of elder and dependent adult abuse in Contra Costa County in 2022.

APS for older and dependent adults is similar to Child Protective Services for children. However, one major difference is that APS clients as adults have the right to refuse services unless a court determines they lack the capacity to make decisions.

For reporting purposes, California considers an elder to be age 60 and older. A dependent adult is

someone age 18 to 59 who, due to certain mental or physical disabilities, is unable to perform normal activities and/or protect herself or himself.

If you are concerned about someone and suspect s/he is experiencing abuse, call the **APS hotline at** (925) 602-4179 or (877) 839-4347. The reporting party's name always remains confidential.



Headlines Microsoft Office (0365) Upgrade

EHSD-IT is upgrading Microsoft Office for the department. The current version is MS Office 2016 and IT has initiated a project to upgrade to Office 365. The initial pilot for the conversion to Office 365 involved migrating the technology staff. This migration is complete, and helped us anticipate and prepare for a wider implementation.

Below is the upcoming schedule for the department-wide upgrade and what to expect.

The goal is to offer better integration, improved security, and continuity of service across all Bureaus and Departments. Office 365 will provide and integrate with cloud-hosted tools like SharePoint Online and One Drive (like your current share drives, but without requiring VPN access), and includes 1 TB of
